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Penang Japanese Language Society (PJLS)

Introduction of your organization

I am from Penang Japanese Language Society (PJLS). This society was formed on the idea that additional knowledge was good for the betterment of Malaysians as in the year of 70's and 80's, there was an influx of Japanese investment setting many factories in Malaysia and as an applicant or jobproficiency in hunter, Japanese language surely would help him/her in the ease of communication and also enhance his/her chances of working in Japanese companies. Therefore, Japanese language might be a tool to help all interested Malaysians. In April 1982, the Penang Japanese Language Society was formally recognized and registered as an organization, thus to open its doors for all Malaysians to study and learn Japanese language in the premises of PJLS.

What is your relationship with Japan?

I was working in a steel mill which was the partnership between Japanese Steel Mill known as Yawata Tetsu and a Malaysia government-linked company. The cooperation between Malaysia and Japan formed the Malayawata Steel Berhad, arising from the combination of Malaysia and Yawata. It was the first

Japanese investment in the heavy industry in Malaysia and there were hundreds of Japanese technicians and engineers. For the convenience of communication with these Japanese, I decided to learn Japanese language, subsequently became acquainted with Japanese cultures through learning.



How is your involvement in Japanese related activities?

Through the learning of Japanese language, I acquainted with some of the Japanese teachers. The teachers were friendly and time after time, they would invite the whole class students to their houses to share Japanese food and movies.



What is the most interesting element about Japan?

The cleanliness of the environment is the most interesting element that attracts me. In most of the roads and streets in Japan, you can hardly find a single dust-bin or rubbish bin and yet you can't find any rubbish scattering around.

Who is the Japanese person who has influenced you the most?


